MARINES PAVE WAY FOR LARGER FORCE IN AUSTRALIA



U.S. officials have announced plans to send a second force of roughly 250 Marines to Australia next spring, following reports released by the Australian government on Oct. 4, stating U.S. presence in Darwin has infused the economy with \$1.8 million. "As a next step, an assessment will now be undertaken of the impacts of rotational deployments of up to 1,100 U.S. Marines to northern Australia," said Australia Defence Minister Stephen Smith and Warren Snowdon, minister for defence science and personnel, in a joint statement. Officials expect to see that number grow to 2,500 by

WARRIORS AND DOGS BOND ON BATTLEFIELD



Explosives-sniffing dogs are not only one of the most effective weapons in the Afghan war, but a source of comfort and comradeship for their Marine handlers. A constant target of insurgents who recognize the value of the dogs, the canines and their owners create a strong bond on the battlefield, fighting side-by-side in the fight against improvised explosives, the Taliban's weapon of choice. "I never thought there was the possibility of getting that close to a dog before I had this job," said Cpl. Joseph Singer. Singer was injured by a grenade in July and his first thought was his dog, Yona. "Make sure my dog is all right," Singer told his colleagues as a

MARINES TRAIN IN EVACUATION EXERCISE



More than 100 Marines and civilian role players took part in a U.S. embassy emergency evacuation simulation at Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center in Twentynine Palms, Calif., Oct. 19. The drill, simulating what may happen if an embassy in a foreign country needs to be quickly evacuated, is practiced twice a year by Marine expeditionary forces and, is an important skill to maintain, as demonstrated by the recent attacks on the American consulate in Libya. "The Marine Corps is pretty much the only force capable of doing this," said base spokesman Capt. Nicholas Mannweiler, since it has both ground and air capabilities. "Every Marine

The 844-foot-long ship is the fourth to bear the name *America* and features a two-acre flight deck that will soon hold a crew of up to about 1,800 Marines, plus fighter planes and helicopters. Unlike older ships, the *America* does not have a well deck for launching amphibious landing craft, thus relying on aircraft to ferry troops and supplies to a beachhead.

President Barack Obama intends to nominate Lt. Gen. John Paxton to become the next assistant commandant of the Marine Corps, announced Defense Secretary Leon Panetta, Oct. 18. If confirmed by the Senate, Paxton will pin on a fourth star and replace Gen. Joseph Dunford, who Obama has slated to succeed Gen. John Allen as the top commander of U.S. and NATO forces in Afghanistan. Paxton is currently the commanding general of Marine Corps Forces Command in Norfolk, Va., where he also leads Fleet Marine Force Atlantic and Marine Corps Forces Europe. His potential promotion to four-star general would give the Corps six officers at

AFGHAN FORCES GAIN CAPABILITY, RESPECT



After a 10-month deployment of Marines and Sailors from Regimental Combat Team 6, Afghan forces in the Helmand Province are making steady progress in assuming more responsibility in protecting their people and allowing the U.S. to lessen their involvement, reported Col. John Shafer. "We reduced the force in the regimental combat team by approximately 60 percent, and we have made up the difference with the Afghan national security forces," he said. This shift has gained Afghan forces respect from their nation -- an important factor in long-term mission success and U.S. drawdown. **Read more**

ARLINGTON CEMETERY RELEASES NEW DIGITAL MAP



On Monday, at the Association of the United States Army convention, Patrick Hallihan, Superintendant of Arlington National Cemetery, debuted an interactive map that is available to the public through its website and a free smartphone app. The map provides details pertaining to each of the roughly 400,000 buried there, including dates of birth and death, as well as photos of the headstones. Monuments and memorials that commemorate the services of specific military units are also visible. YUMA MARINES GET READY FOR F-35B OPS




Marine Corps Air Station Yuma, Ariz. is preparing to begin operations for the first operational F-35B squadron arriving next month. Six pilots have been tapped for early operations at Yuma but cannot begin training until the Marine Corps has implemented a foundation for the squadron's infrastructure at the base, including delivery of an Autonomic Information Logistic System, used to manage the F-35's health, diagnostics, and mission planning. The first F-35B is expected at Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 121 in early November, with the second slated for delivery midmonth. A total of 16 F-35Bs -- the number needed for full operational

capability -- are expected at the base within the next year. Read more

OCTOBER 28, 1962

An 11,000-man 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade left Camp Pendleton, Calif. by sea for the Caribbean

during the Cuban Missile Crisis. One week earlier, the entire 189,000-man Marine Corps had been put on alert and elements of the 1st and 2nd Marine Divisions were sent to Guantanamo Bay to reinforce the defenders of the U.S. Naval Base. Other 2nd Division units and squadrons from five Marine Aircraft Groups were deployed at Key West, Fla., or in Caribbean waters during the Cuban crisis.
