



# ***Master Bedroom***

The master bedroom is an original room with the addition of the bathroom. Most of the furnishings were purchased through the gift fund.



## ***Gray Bed***

The four-poster bed was manufactured by the Sealy Corporation and was a gift to the Home from General and Mrs. Gray, our 29th Commandant.



## ***Master Bathroom***


The master bathroom was added in 1915 in conjunction with additions on the first floor that created a coatroom and half bath.



## ***Guest Room***


The guest room is one of the original rooms to the second floor, but no longer retains its original size or shape. In 1840 the guest room was expanded during the addition of the annex.





## ***First Bathroom***

The 1840 two-story annex that was built on the northeast corner of the Home increased the size of the bedroom and made provisions for the first bathroom in the Home. The bathroom was remodeled in 1934 and 2003. This bathroom remained the only facilities in the Home until additional facilities were added about 1915. *(not seen in photo)*



## **Commandant's Study**

The study is an original room of the Home and is used by the Commandant as a personal study. The mahogany paneling was installed by the Barracks master cabinetmaker in the early 1970s.

### **Hayden Trophy**

The Indian brave statue is known as the Hayden Trophy. Between 1912 and 1927, the Marine Corps Rifle Team competed for this trophy on 10 different occasions in a rifle competition hosted by the New England Rifle Association. The Marine Team won eight of the competitions and was permanently awarded the trophy.



## *Washington Desk*

The federal style, two-sided desk was designed by Thomas Jefferson and is an exact replica of the 1789 desk that George Washington used while President that year.

## **Third Floor • Hallway**

The third floor is not original to the Home. In 1806 when the Home was completed, this area was an attic space. In 1891, Colonel McCawley, the 8th Commandant had the entire attic area converted to a useable third floor. This construction included the current mansard roof. Today's third floor contains three bedrooms, a sitting room, an office and a large central hallway.



### **Vandegrift Desk**

The Rosewood, Anglo-Chinese desk belonged to General Vandegrift, our 18th Commandant. Sitting on top of the desk is a sand shaker and ink stand. The sand shaker was used for drying ink on paper vice blotting. The shaker and stand dates back to 1850.

Tall Case Clock***

Inside the door are the original documents on the clock from the Jack family. Major General and Mrs. Samuel S. Jack presented the clock to the Home in 1983.



***Cherry Wood Melodeon***

The melodeon is circa 1830 and was made by the Prescott Melodeon Company of Concord, New Hampshire.
