

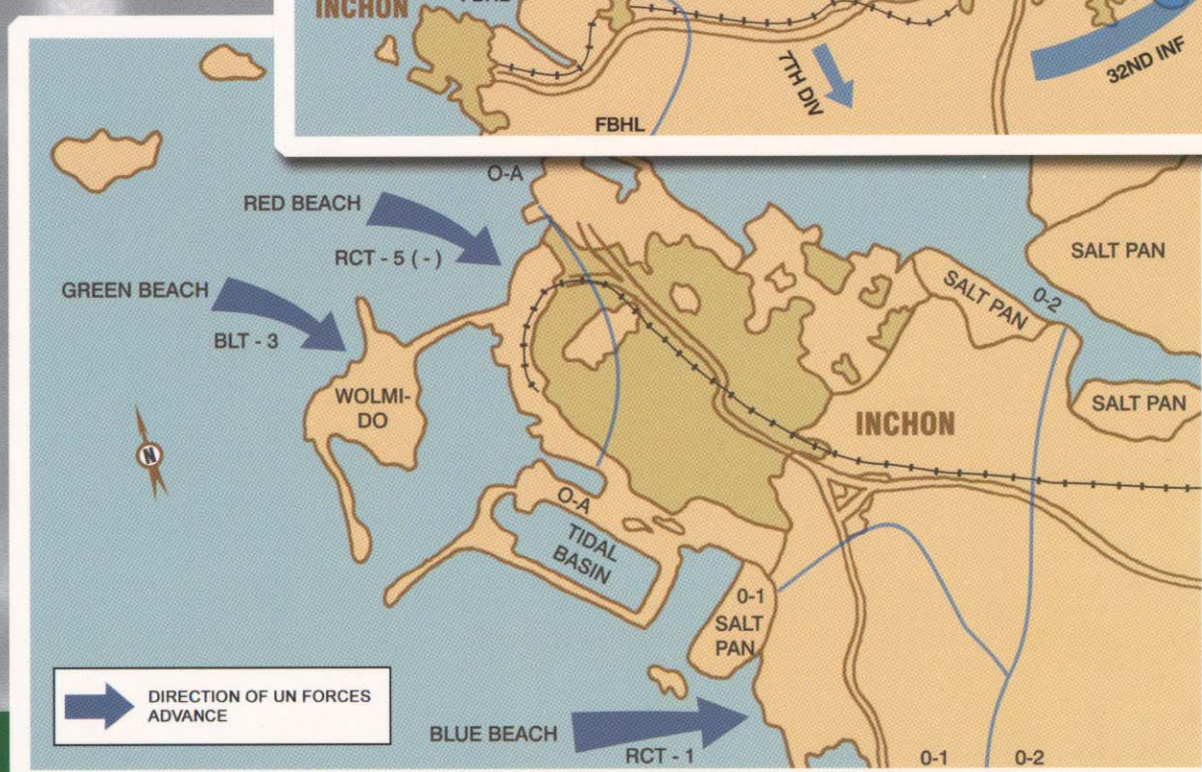
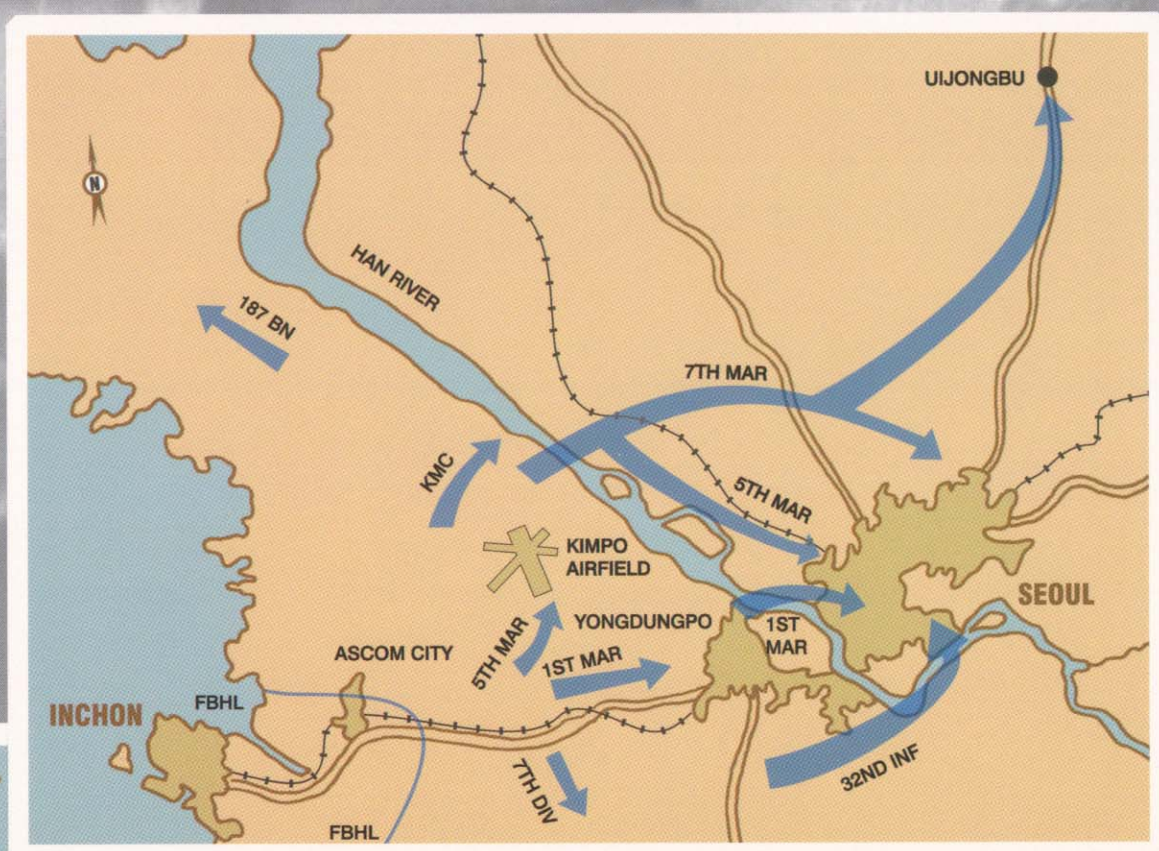
MARINES IN KOREA

INCHON-SEOUL

SEPTEMBER 1950: With the North Korean People's Army held in check at the Pusan Perimeter, Marines of the "Fire Brigade" were assembled with the newly arrived 1st and 7th Marine Regiments to form the 1st Marine Division and lead the amphibious landing at Inchon on September 15, 1950. This strategic gamble by General MacArthur caught the North Korean People's Army off guard and, by the end of September, Marines were leading UN Forces in the recapture of Seoul, the capital of South Korea.
